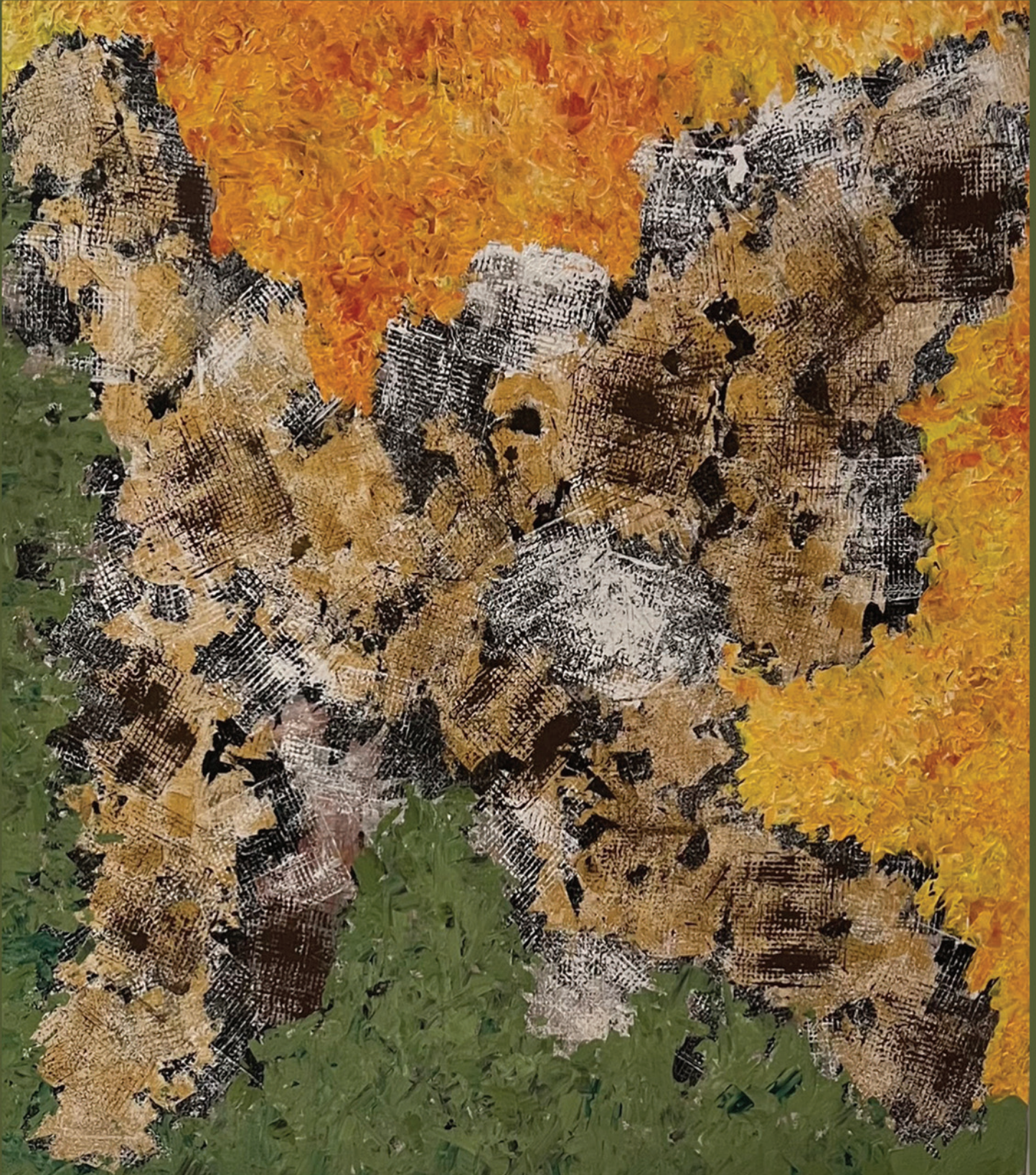

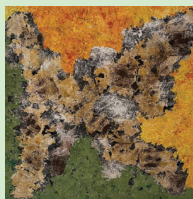

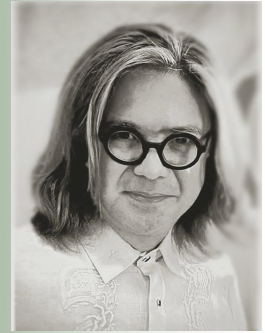

FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK

DR. GREGORIO T. SINGIAN PCS Founder & First President

Dr. Gregorio Torres Singian was born on May 9, 1872 in San Fernando, Pampanga to Cristino Singian de Miranda and Angela Torres. His parents were descendants of prominent families in the province.

Dr. Singian obtained his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1889 at the San Juan de Letran College in Manila. He finished his medical degree at the University of Santo Tomas Faculty of Medicine and Surgery in 1895 graduating with highest honors as summa cum laude.

He already was a full-fledged physician by the time the Philippine Revolution suddenly broke out on August 1896. Three years later, following the outbreak of the Filipino-American War on February 4, 1899, Dr. Singian volunteered to serve as a battlefield doctor to the Filipino troops in Pampanga; initially in San Fernando, under the command of General Maximino Hizon and later, in Bacolor, headed by General Tomas Mascardo.

One of the revolutionary leaders who Dr. Singian personally treated was Major Manuel L. Quezon. While serving as an ayuda-de-campo to Gen. Emilio Aguinaldo in the revolutionary army, Maj. Quezon contracted malaria. Singian transferred the young officer to his own home province of Pampanga and provided him with

medical treatment free of charge until his full recovery. The future Philippine President and Dr. Singian developed an enduring friendship.

After the revolutionary war, Dr. Singian joined the UST College of Medicine in 1900 as a faculty member of the Surgery Department while he was still a resident physician at the San Juan de Dios Hospital. In 1903, he founded a hospital and training school (probably for nurses) at the San Miguel district, Quiapo. (The Singian Clinic Building, still existing, was later transformed into the National Center for Geriatric Health during President G.M. Arroyo's term. It remained operational under the financial control of the Jose R. Reyes Memorial Medical Center until 2011 when it became an independent entity under the Department of Health. In 2012, it was reverted to the JRRMMC).

In 1907, Dr. Singian was designated the first Filipino associate professor of surgery in the Philippine Medical School (now known as the University of the Philippines College of Medicine). In 1911, he was appointed professor of Surgical Anatomy at the University of Santo Tomas.

He was also an Editor of the publication “Revisita Filipina de Medicina y Farmacia” (Philippine Review of Medicine and Pharmacy), a professional journal for medical practitioners written in Spanish serving as the official newsletter of the UST College of Medicine and Pharmacy that came out with its first publication on July 1910. The medical journal was issued on a monthly basis.

Dr. Singian was of an era when physicians were mostly general practitioners and delved into the different specialties. He travelled extensively across the European continent, visiting various clinics in order to acquire expertise in surgery and shared these updates back in his home country. He was dubbed as “El Mago del Bisturie” (The Magician of the Scalpel).

Together with Dr. Basilio Valdez, he introduced numerous improvements in the operating rooms of the UST Faculty of Medicine and Surgery such as establishing separate operating rooms for clean and septic cases, sterilization room for instrument and bandages, overhead observation galleries with thick glass panels for medical students in operating

theaters that were equipped with microphones for the surgeon to describe the surgical procedure. He instituted a central medical records section for the hospital. It is also noted that Dr. Singian donated Php 200,000 worth of radium to the hospital for cancer treatment. He likewise implemented sanitary improvements in the hospital’s dietary service.

Dr. Singian was named to the Board of Directors of the San Juan de Dios Hospital in 1919 and soon became the Director of the hospital the following year. His administration was marked by the introduction of improvements and innovations in the methods of medical treatment employed in the hospital. Dr. Singian also became Head of the Department of Surgery and General Supervisor of Internship at the UST. During this period, San Juan de Dios Hospital was then affiliated with UST and functioned as the College’s clinical arm (as decreed by King Alfonso of Spain on October 29, 1875). The hospital formed part of the UST Department of Surgery in 1929 where Dr. Singian started the surgical residency program that shaped Philippine surgery to what it is today.

Referred to at times as the “Father of Philippine Surgery”, Dr. Singian founded the Philippine College of Surgeons on September 1936 and was later elected as its first President.

Dr. Singian passed away in Hong Kong on January 29, 1937 at the age of 64.

Change and Continuity

In the course of history, civilizations have been known to persist due to continuity – continuity of trade, continuity of beliefs, continuity of shared experiences. They flourished due to common culture, communication, and population. But through the course of their existence, it was inevitable that changes would be introduced to effect continuity. Change was in a way an adaptation to existing forces, to strengthen prevailing conditions and to adjust to the changing landscape, be it economy, religion, or trade.

In the same way, the Philippine College of Surgeons has existed due to continuity. For the past 87 years, the College has been true to the purpose it was established: “to maintain an organization of surgeons for the advancement of the science and art of surgery, with the welfare of patients in mind, and to promote the ethical and competent practice of the specialty” (PCS Amended Articles of Incorporation, 1995). The College has been unwavering in its implementation of its flagship programs, “National Programs shall be established whenever necessary and within the capability of the College. These shall include but shall not be limited

to the following: Trauma, Cancer, Outreach Services, and Infection Control” (PCS By-Laws 2011). To date, the College has 53 committees and subcommittees, each with its own mandate, contributing to the functions and implementation of the PCS’ programs.

In 2019, three Commissions were formed, the Cancer Commission, the Trauma, Burn and Injury Care and the S.U.R.E Commission. This was a result of extensive discussion among members of Board of Regents – that there was a need to espouse health and health advocacies of the PCS and bring them beyond the College. “The BOR is empowered to create other commissions of the PCS which shall act as external arms of the College primarily concerned with PCS flagship programs directed to specific areas of national concern” (PCS Administrative Manual, 2019).

As our name respectfully announces, we are the PHILIPPINE College of Surgeons. It is sometimes taken for granted and overlooked that the College is part of the Philippines, a sovereign country, in the Southeast Asian region. Thus, it is expected, and rightly so, that we take part in nation-building.

The ASEAN Professional Qualifications Framework was first introduced in 2014 and its form finally approved in 2017 (ASEAN Qualifications Reference Framework, ASEAN Economic Ministers, 2014). This is a regional reference framework that will allow member nations to compare education qualifications. In response to this, the Philippines' Professional Regulation Commission issued guidelines for the formulation of Guidelines on the Creation and Implementation of a Career Progression and Specialization Program for the Regulated Professions (PRC Resolution No. 1117, Series of 2018).

Under the Philippine Qualifications Framework (PQF), there are 8 Levels of Qualification, with Level 8 as the highest one can attain. This level is specific for those who have doctoral and post-doctoral degrees. A Level 7 is a post baccalaureate degree, equivalent to a master's program. A Doctor of Medicine is not considered a doctoral degree even if "doctor" is in the title. Thus, a student who has finished a medical degree and passed the licensure exam is in Level 7 (<https://pqf.gov.ph/>).

Physicians are under the PRC Board of Medicine with regards to Career Progression and Specialization Program-Credit Accumulation and Transfer System (CPSP-CATS). The PRC wishes to recognize the additional years of training and certification that each medical specialist undertakes and

incorporate this in the PQF. Thus, those who have undertaken residency training in accredited training programs and have passed their certifying examinations as provided by the respective boards of the accredited training programs will be classified under Level 8, the highest in the PQF. Residents remain under Level 7, together with those who have trained but have not yet been certified.

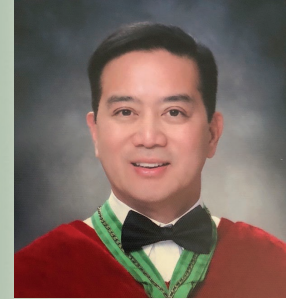
Considering the enhancement of the PQF of the country, the Board of Regents recognizes the need to include among our members those who have trained in training programs under the different specialties recognized by the PCS. Those certified by the different specialties under the different specialty boards are also to be included in the membership of the PCS. This is the chance of the College to assist and support them in their ascendancy in the PQF levels.

This change in membership classifications in the college is not a step backwards, nor should it be misconstrued as a recognition of the unqualified. As there are different levels of membership, so too, will there be different levels of privileges for the resident, the associate, the diplomate, and the fellow.

Change and continuity will always be a part of history, whether that of civilization or an institution. And I ask that we embrace change as a step forward in the Philippine College of Surgeons' history and maturity.

PCS Board of Regents Honors Dr. Teodoro Herbosa for his Appointment as Secretary of Health

In a momentous ceremony held at the Department of Health, the esteemed Board of Regents proudly presented Dr. Teodoro Herbosa, the newly appointed Department of Health (DOH) Secretary, with a resolution, acknowledging his remarkable achievements in the field of healthcare administration and his invaluable contributions to advancing public health in the Philippines, particularly that of Trauma and Disaster Preparedness. Resolution 2023-10 was unanimously approved by the PCS Board of Regents last July 15, 2023, and was presented to Dr Herbosa last August 4, in his office at the Department of Health.

Dr. Herbosa's appointment as DOH Secretary marked a significant milestone in his already illustrious career. A seasoned medical professional with decades of experience, Dr. Herbosa has consistently demonstrated an unwavering commitment to improving healthcare systems, trauma care, and disaster management within the Philippines. Dr Herbosa formerly worked as a Department of Health Undersecretary between 2010 and 2015. During this time, he played a role in various projects like the Hospital Accreditation Commission, modernizing the Philippine Orthopedics Center, and advancing Public-Private Partnerships in Health. He earned his medical degree from UP-Manila and a bachelor's degree in Biology from UP-Diliman. Between October 2017 and April 2021, he served as the Executive Vice President of the UP System. Dr Herbosa held other positions including Chief Division of Trauma at the Department of Surgery in the Philippine General Hospital, Chair of the Board for Physicians for Peace Philippines, and 3rd Vice President of the UP Alumni Association. He taught at the Emergency Department of Hospital Universiti Kebangsaan in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, and the National University of Malaysia. He also sat on the Board of Directors for the World Association for Disaster and Emergency Medicine (WADEM), advised the Australasian Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians in Melbourne, Australia, and

acted as a Regional Education Coordinator for the HOPE Program at John Hopkins University's Center for International Emergencies, Disasters, and Refugee Studies (CIEDRS). He advised the National Task Force Against COVID-19 and consulted internationally in countries like Palau, Maldives, Malaysia, Pakistan, India, Bangladesh, Nepal, Vietnam, Tunisia, and Thailand. His contributions have significantly impacted emergency medicine and trauma care. Dr Herbosa played a key role in creating the STOP DEATH Program and participated in the Safe Surgery Saves Lives Global Task Force, responsible for the WHO safe surgery checklist. Proposed Amendments to PCS By-Laws: Pioneering Professional Integration

In a pivotal move to adapt to the evolving landscape of healthcare and surgery, the Philippine College of Surgeons (PCS) has introduced proposed amendments to its By-Laws through the establishment of an Adhoc Committee on Professional Integration, chaired by Regent, Dr. Esperanza R. Lahoz. These proposed changes reflect the PCS's expanded responsibilities, now encompassing not only the professional growth of its Fellows but also active participation in nation-building and the transformation of the medical field within the Philippines.

Over the years, the PCS has been at the forefront of advocating for Filipino surgeons, representing their interests in various government agencies such as the Professional Regulation Commission (PRC), Department of Health (DOH), and Philippine Health Insurance Corporation (PhilHealth). The College's engagement with non-government organizations has also strengthened its position as a pivotal player in the medical community.

A significant achievement attributed to the PCS is its crucial role in formulating the pending Physicians' Act in Congress, spearheaded by then 2019 PCS President, Dr. George G. Lim. This legislative endeavor underlines the PCS's commitment to the integration of the entire medical profession, including surgeons. The impending implementation of the Universal Health Care (UHC) policy further underscores the need for proactive adaptation within the field of surgery in the Philippines.

In addition, the PCS acknowledges the mutual recognition arrangement (MRA) among ASEAN countries, emphasizing the necessity to identify and certify specialists across borders. Within the Philippines, the PRC exclusively recognizes the PCS as the authoritative organization for surgical specialties, amplifying the College's role in shaping surgical standards and practices.

The proposed amendments seek to build upon this legacy and address the ever-evolving challenges faced by the medical community. The creation of two new categories of membership, namely "Associate"

and "Diplomate," represents a significant step forward. These categories are designed to encompass a wider range of medical professionals and specialists, aligning with the PCS's goal of holistic professional integration.

The emergence of the UHC, impending legislative changes, and the ASEAN MRA necessitate a comprehensive approach to surgical practice and professional representation. The PCS's commitment to nurturing surgeons from their early residency training, through the rigorous specialty board examinations, until they attain the esteemed status of Fellow within their respective specialty, is integral to the College's vision of excellence.

In conclusion, the proposed amendments to the Philippine College of Surgeons' By-Laws are a testament to the College's visionary leadership and its unwavering dedication to the advancement of surgery and healthcare in the Philippines. The creation of Associate and Diplomate categories marks a bold step towards integrating the medical profession, ensuring that the PCS continues to be a beacon of innovation and excellence within the medical landscape of the nation.

Amendments are indicated in bold letters & underlined.

ARTICLE I - **Section 1. Membership**

The College shall be composed of Fellows, Honorary Fellows, **Diplomates, Associates** and Resident Members.

Section 4. Diplomate

A Diplomate is a surgeon who has graduated from a surgical residency training program duly accredited by a PCS specialty society; has passed that specialty board's certifying examination/s recognized by the PCS.

Section 5. Associate

An Associate is a surgeon who has graduated from a residency training program duly accredited by a PCS specialty society but has not taken or passed that specialty board's certifying examinations.

Section 6. Resident Member

ARTICLE III – Fellowship Rights and Privileges

Section 1 - Rights

Membership in the College and all rights arising there from are personal and non-transferable. These rights may be limited or denied by the Board of Regents based on standard corporate practice.

Section 2 - Privileges of a Fellow

Privileges inherent to fellowship may be extended or suspended by the Board of Regents based on compliance with the duties and obligations of membership.

A Fellow shall have the right to participate in any scientific and social activities of the College with a preferential rate and enjoy the goodwill and use of the facilities of the organization. They may be invited to be speakers, chair or members of the Committees
Fellows shall be allowed to use the suffix “FPCS” to indicate their membership category in the College.

Section 4 – Rights and Privileges of Diplomates and Associates

a) Diplomate

A Diplomate shall have the right to participate in any of the scientific and social activities of the College with a preferential rate and enjoy the goodwill and use of the facilities of the organization. He/She may be invited to be a member of National Committee/s. He/She shall have such other privileges as stated in the administrative manual.

He/She cannot vote and be voted upon for any elective office of the College.

Diplomates shall not be allowed to use the suffix “FPCS”. They can use “Diplomate PCS” to indicate their membership category in the College.

b) Associate

An Associate shall have the privilege to participate in any of the scientific and social activities of the College with a preferential rate and conditionally enjoy the goodwill and use of the facilities of the organization. He/She shall have such other privileges as stated in the administrative manual.

He/She cannot vote and cannot be voted upon for any elective office of the College.

Associates shall not be allowed to use the suffix “FPCS”. However, they can use “Associate PCS” to indicate their membership category in the College.

ARTICLE IV – Maintenance of Membership

Section 1 - Good standing

Maintenance of professional competence and personal integrity, as well as the faithful compliance with the duties and obligations of membership, are requisites for maintenance of membership. The Board of Regents may from time to time promulgate additional requirements.

Section 2 - Discipline

c. Membership shall be terminated for failure to meet financial obligations imposed by the College or for failure to attend either the Annual or Midyear Conventions for three (3) consecutive years or, for failure to satisfy other requirements which the Board of Regents may impose for the maintenance of membership, provided that such other requirements shall have been ratified by a majority of all the Fellows in good standing.

Section 3 - Inactive Status

The Board of Regents may grant inactive status to members who are incapacitated or retired from active practice of Surgery. They are exempted from the payment of dues, fees and assessments, but may continue to enjoy the rights and privileges of membership.

Section 4 – Reinstatement

The Board of Regents may reinstate members under the following circumstances: a) when the termination is due only to failure to comply with the financial requirements of the College; and b) when termination is based on an erroneous judgment.

—
As of this writing, Fellows in good standing have been given electronic survey forms for them to cast their votes on the proposed amendments. The Adhoc Committee on Professional Integration, in behalf of the PCS Board of Regents, has also called for an online PCS Town Hall Meeting to present and discuss the amendments to the PCS By-Laws on August 18, 2023, at 7:00 PM. The Approval of these changes will be part of the Agenda of the Annual Business Meeting of the Philippine College of Surgeons on December 3, 2023, from 11:00 AM to 1:00 PM at the Isla Ballroom 3 of the EDSA Shangri-La Hotel Manila, Mandaluyong City.



PCS 49th Midyear Convention

This glorious affair - 9 years since the last hosting of the PCS Davao Southern Mindanao (DSM) Chapter - came into fruition upon the arrival of more than 1000 delegates on the 4th of May 2023 in the Durian and Chocolate Capital of the Philippines.

The PCS 49th Midyear Convention entitled Surgery and Universal Health Care was held at SMX Convention Center in Davao City on May 4-5, 2023 and hosted by PCS Davao Southern Mindanao Chapter. The said event, deemed a success, opened with an inspiring speech by Vice President Inday Sara Duterte-Carpio. Various programs that followed were organized by the many subspecialty societies and organizations under PCS.

One of the many highlights of the convention was the active participation of Mindanao-wide multi-specialty colleagues and national key stakeholders on the Universal Health Care (UHC) Summit. The main authors and honored speakers took action in the conversations on Universal Health Care and its effects on general and specialty medical practice and on the Filipino community.

The Fellowship Night held on the first evening of the convention had a theme: Kadayawan Festival in May. The awe-inspiring production and stunts of the Mindanao performers during the night was equal in magnitude with the staggering feast and prizes prepared by PCS and the DSM chapter.





With a wide array of topics for all surgeons involved, it was only apt to culminate the convention with the Dr. Alex Lay Tan Memorial Lecture for his lasting legacy on the expert practice of surgical oncology in Davao City and in the whole country. There were also community services hosted by different societies and PCS Fellows in many locations of Mindanao.

The PCS 49th Midyear Convention was truly an exceptional celebration of intellect and holistic view to improved circumstances in universal health care. This was an opportunity after the pandemic wherein we were able to step away from the virtual screen and rebuild in-person relationships between colleagues, friends and Fellows.



UHC Stakeholders' Summit Synthesis

We face the challenge of having a varied understanding of UHC mandates by different stakeholders. But Sen. Bong Go has effectively articulated the UHC vision through a story. At the end of the day, what will matter is that our people, especially the poor will be able to access care and not have to line up to multiple offices to beg for help. PCS is on the right track by engaging in the UHC dialog to carry the voice of surgeons and better understand and respond to the concerns of other stakeholders. The discussions this afternoon have unearthed very complex and highly value-laden issues that are not easy to resolve and address. The proposal for a high level commission to study and provide guidance on UHC implementation is a very timely recommendation.

The UHC law was passed nearly 4 years ago but understanding of the law's spirit and intent and expectations in implementation vary among stakeholders. But according to Senator Bong Go, the goal is clear to ensure that health services are accessible, especially for the poor.

Dr. Juvie Villaflor and Dr. Connie Vesagas offered this UHC Summit as a way for PCS to bridge the knowledge gap and set off a process of dialog among the community of surgeons and with government and other stakeholders.

The role of surgery in primary health care is critical as access to lifesaving surgery is among the most cost-effective health interventions based on the Copenhagen Consensus. Access to essential surgical care should be one of the outcome goals of UHC in addition to financial risk protection. Dr. Chacon reported that surgeons have introduced several measures to increase access to surgical services, e.g. training family physicians and task shifting, surgical residency rotations and outreach missions. Surgical access can also be increased by complying with the 10% ward bed mandate in the UHC Act.

Dr. Enrique Ona recalled that surgeons have been part of the long history of health reform such as through formal specialization, setting the

RVUs in Medicare as the precursor of DRGs, among others. The UHC Act mandated a shift to DRG-based global budget payments. But DRG is a very complicated procedure that our systems may not be ready to implement. Dr. Olarte explained the complex nature of the DRG system. While the shift may have improved access from a public health standpoint, Dr. Leo Olarte also warned that some studies report association with a decline in the quality of surgical care as shown by the 5-fold increase in OPD surgeries, shorter hospital stay and higher readmission rates. This is not counting fraud in claims by unduly reporting higher severity to get higher pay, i.e. DRG creep.

Dr. Alvin Marcelo explained that UHC such as the adoption of DRGs and use of EMRs require higher IT requirements, for both PhilHealth and from providers. He also warned that poorly designed IT systems can worsen health outcomes and practitioners need to be actively engaged in its development. Dr. Marcelo recommended the MIND THE GAPS as guiding framework for developing IT systems and called for a national and provider level blueprint. AVP Rulloda emphasized the need for strengthening PhilHealth's IT system, i.e. coming up with standards and a blueprint given the mandate for universal enrolment and immediate eligibility, registration with primary care networks for access to a comprehensive benefit package, and shift to DRG based global budget payments.

Dr. Ona challenged the surgeons to engage DOH and PhilHealth in developing a system that is suitable and practical for our setting. Dr. Art Flores conveyed the concern of PHAPI on how the professional fees and Konsulta capitation will be computed. The way benefit payments are designed pose challenges in private hospitals where the doctors are not salaried. Dr. Ona said that surgeons need to explain the need for balance in expanding access to care and ensuring quality of care, including protecting the doctor-patient relationship, autonomy in practice and setting professional fees with fixed copayments by third party payers like PhilHealth.

PCS should lead efforts in carrying the voice of surgeons in defining the path for UHC in the country. This and more were discussed during the UHC Stakeholders' Summit during the PCS Midyear Convention in Davao City on May 4, 2023.

VP Rulloda of PhilHealth assured stakeholders that the development of these systems will be done in close consultation. PhilHealth is also continuously learning from implementation experience. Sen. Go challenged PhilHealth and DOH to step up to the challenge of realizing UHC in the country especially that 40% of health expenditures are from out-of-pocket sources. While government health expenditures have increased, there is a need to increase government spending and improve efficiency in fund management to meet expectations from UHC and reverse the decline in the share of PhilHealth financing. Sen. Bong Go highlighted the need to invest in expanding the capacity of our health system and to focus efforts and subsidies to the poor. Another source of government financing are the LGUs that are mandated to pool their funds in a Special Health Fund, but this process is highly

variable given the preferences of participating LGUs.

Dr. Hilton Lam warned of rationing if UHC benefits increase but financing and health system capacity will not keep pace. Assignment of accountabilities need to be clarified as heavy reliance in SHI financing can lead to hospital bias and increase inequity. In the case of hospitals and the health care industry, Dr. Lirio saw challenges in cost containment and viability given that medical inflation has a faster rate of increase. On top of this, PHAPI members are agonizing over delayed payments. Shortage in health workers also put the health system at risk.

On the whole, the discussions unearthed technically complex and highly value-laden topics. PCS should continue this dialog in its annual convention and set up an engagement process with stakeholders. Sen. Bong Go illustrated how the poor are failed by our current system. Dr. Ona's suggestion to convene a multidisciplinary team or commission to guide monitor and evaluate UHC implementation is a timely suggestion.

The Philippine Medical Association, since its inception in 1903, has always been at the forefront of health care delivery in the country. An article written by Dr. Santiago S. Del Rosario, PMA President for 1988 to 1989 (PMA Legacy – Philippine Medical Association), highlights PMA's pioneering efforts hand-in-hand with the Philippine Republic: establishing within its first decade a second medical school (presumably the University of the Philippines College of Medicine), and several hospitals including the Philippine General Hospital; creation of the Department of Health (1939), the Board of Examiners in Medicine and Surgery (1944 to 1954), the Food and Drugs and Cosmetics Board (1954 to 1964, later on to become the Food and Drug Administration), and the Dangerous Drugs Board (1964 to 1965). Likewise, it also put forth the idea of medical care, actualized with the Philippine Medical Care Commission, which eventually became the Philippine Health Insurance Corporation.

PMA has always championed the improvement of the quality of health care, especially public health - hygiene, sanitation, and immunization; taking big strides towards the effective management of communicable diseases, including typhoid fever and cholera; advocating childcare and nutrition (such as “Tiki-tiki” for children when it was discovered that beri-beri or vitamin B deficiency accounted for the high mortality rate of children under 5 years old);

and initiated the public declaration on the dangers of tobacco and smoking.

Now, with over a hundred thousand physicians spread across most of the main Philippine islands, PMA turns inward to focus on its membership base. Critical is the passage into law of the proposed Philippine Medical Act of 2023, which seeks to reinvigorate the Medical Act of 1959 and mandate all licensed physicians in the Philippines to be members of the PMA, and thus solidify its ranks and contribute to the actualization of its Mission and Vision put forth as follows:

Mission

A dynamic, responsive, and unified PMA committed to serve its members thru increased benefits, enhanced professional development, and the promotion and defense of the rights and privileges of the Medical Profession.

These efforts, in partnership with other organizations and the Government, shall contribute to excellent healthcare delivery to its patients and the community at large.

ONE PMA: Service to the Profession

I became a member of the Philippine Medical Association (PMA) in 1997 only after my training in general surgery. Why?

A. PMA membership is not required of a licensed MD.

B: I was just too lazy to drop by the Quezon City Medical Society (QCMS) office which was just minutes away from my residence AND from my workplace.

C: I did not see the benefit in becoming a member of the PMA.

Answer: A and C.

Or more precisely, D: I was already a pre-resident and busy assisting in surgery at the time of the Physician Oath-Taking. This was the time when an officer of the PMA guested to imprint upon eager young doctors the value of joining the club, and outside the doors were staff of the Association waiting to collect dues and sign up the new MDs.

But the message then that was being chain-mailed within our ranks went like this: defer your membership to PMA, because when you sign up, you'd have to start paying your annual dues, which was a hefty PhP 150 back then (valued at PhP 766.01 today according to WorldData.info), or else you'd have to pay arrears. For a government worker on Salary Grade 21, that was advice worth following.

After my training, knowing that I'd have to be a good standing member of a component medical society to apply for Philhealth accreditation, I promptly registered at QCMS. Then transferred my membership to Catanduanes Medical Society (CMS) a few months later, when I was island-based already.

In 1999, two years into my surgical practice in the Land of the Howling Winds, during a meeting of the CMS (and if memory serves me right, the first meeting that was called to elect officers in those two years), I, together with 3 other colleagues, were like deer in headlights as we were ap-POINTED officers by the senior members of the Society. Apparently, this had been our Medical Society's standard for electing officers.

How to serve the component medical society? As there was no turnover from the previous set of officers, we had to recover quickly from our state of shock. I was President, and together with the other officers (Vice- President, Secretary, and Treasurer) agreed on monthly meetings, drawing from our thinly lined pockets to finance our meals. When we found no By-Laws, we immediately drafted one, patterned after that of PMA.

To make a splash into local scene, we made an event out of the induction of officers, inviting the President of the PMA, Dr. Nenita Lee-Tan, and the Regional Governor, Dr. Rodolfo Nitollama. It helped that I was a contributing writer to the weekly tabloid, so this activity made it to the back pages.

Since I was a practicing clinician, medical companies readily volunteered to sponsor continuing medical education activities as well as lay forums. We had an activity every two to three months. When September rolled around, we simply followed the template that PMA set out for the celebration of Medicine Week.

I did all the secretarial work, efficient and cost-effective during this pre-mobile phone era: I wrote and edited the newsletter, and had it mimeographed. My clinic secretary then hand-delivered it to members within Virac, or sent it through jeep and bus lines with a ten-peso "mailing fee" for those in the other ten towns. This way we were able to connect monthly with 50 or so members scattered

throughout the hilly island, most of whom were serving district hospitals or rural health units.

At the same time, we needed to collect the PMA Annual dues and remit (hand-carry) to the PMA office in Quezon City. Having a trustworthy and efficient treasurer is gold. Within the year, we reversed our PMA standing from “poor” (no remittance of dues) to “excellent.” We reconciled our members’ records with that of PMA, mano-mano. For our component society expenses, us officers dipped into our own pockets for the miscellaneous expenses for meetings and administration, guaranteed by unwritten IOUs. Needing funds and needing them fast, and empowered by our newly written By-Laws, we increased our local annual dues from fifty to five hundred pesos. I did not hear the loud complaints of the senior members of the Society since I did not know how to speak the local language.

We started the “For A Cause” fundraisers with ballroom dancing, which was all the rage on the island back then. Our main attraction was imported ballroom dancers from the mainland. Thankful that there was no social media back then, or else I would surely have been bashed by the members, senior and junior alike, for sending them “considered sold” tickets worth PhP 2000 per member (4,769 in today’s pesos). We raised around twenty thousand pesos (or around fifty thousand pesos now), which accounted for most of the funds that we turned over to the next set of officers.

Before my two-year term ended, we proposed local legislation to regulate medical and surgical missions which were not coordinated with the medical society and primarily politically-driven. Worse, there was an ophthalmic mission then that was making the rounds of underserved areas in the country and collecting the Medicare information of patients. The provincial governor welcomed our proposal, and even endorsed this positively to the

Sangguniang Panlalawigan. Alas, I unknowingly crossed an organization of medical practitioners from the island who were already based abroad and were coming home every three years to hold medical missions. In a letter to the editor that was headlined in a local tabloid, I was called out for “just wanting a piece of the action,” and “nursing my government job in order to fish out potential private patients.” I answered back using the politest words I could muster, in a letter to the editor that I sent to THREE tabloids, crawled into my cave with my badly bruised ego for the next three weeks or so. And then poured my heart out in letters to the presidents of both the Philippine Medical Association, AND to the Philippine College of Surgeons (it helped that I was acquainted with the first, and the second was one of my consultants during my training days). I’d like to believe that subsequent resolutions by these organizations on the conduct of foreign medical missions were instigated in part by my letter-writing and follow up of these issues.

Lastly, to ensure the continuity of the Society, we facilitated the election of the next set of officers and prepared for the turnover. For Fiscal Year 2001 to 2003, I turned over CMS to the very capable hands of my Vice-President, Dr. Joselito Urgel, who brought CMS to even greater heights, and became Regional Governor for Bicol. In the following years, I moved on and out to my other professional and regional organizations, the Bicol Chapters of the Philippine College of Surgeons and the Philippine Society of General Surgeons.

I remain in the background of our Medical Society, honored to be called on from time to time as adviser or committee chair or member. Though many more issues would beset our organization, it has survived the past two decades and even thrived during the COVID-19 pandemic, thanks to colleagues who rose to the challenge of leading this organization.

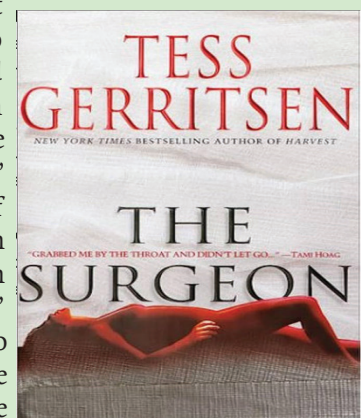

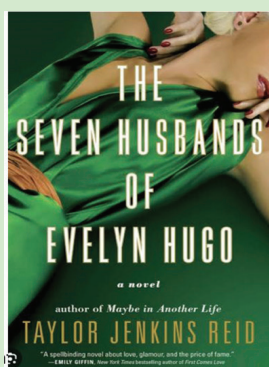


Cordell, a victim of a nearly identical crime two years ago.

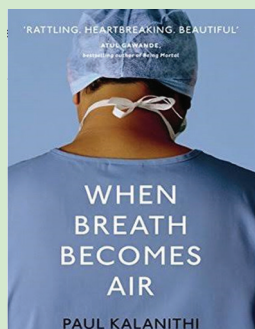

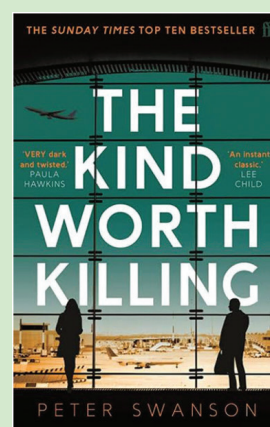

4. The Kind Worth Killing by Peter Swanson

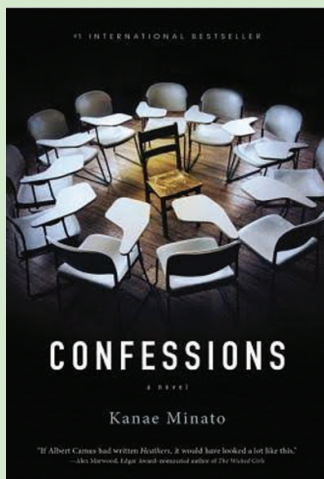

5. Confessions by Kanae Minato

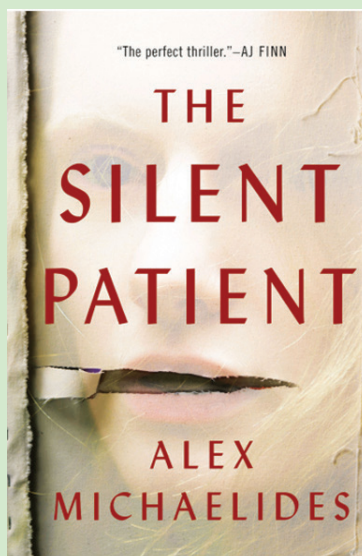

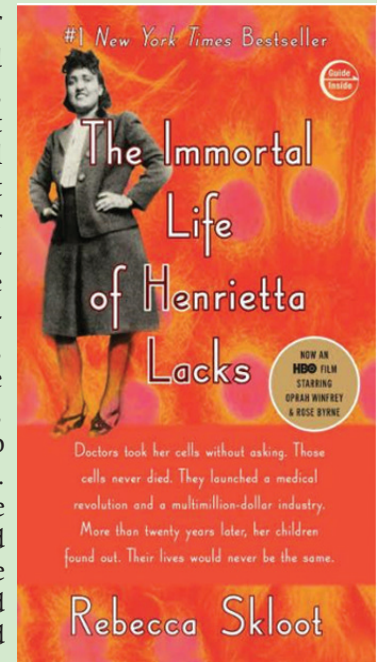

Silent Casualties

I sat silently at the back of the conference room. I have a fairly good idea of what happened during that night when Mr G. died. But then again it was not me who directly handled him. The resident trainee obviously did not make rounds on the patient and he was found lifeless on his bed. A silent casualty. Should I raise my hand and give my two cents or shall I keep my ideas to myself? After all the patient is already dead. But then again, I cannot be silent for I am a physician and I have sworn an oath.

But before I earned the position of seniority, I have undergone the rigorous training of a resident physician and have had my share of mistakes and failures. Even now as a senior consultant and medical specialist, I have to study every case before I go into surgery so much that I usually dream of the procedure the night before I perform them.

Am I worthy to become a mentor to someone?

Do years of experience make one a teacher or is it years of wisdom and not just knowledge? If I do not correct the mistakes or negligence done by the trainees who are part of the department, does that make me an accomplice to the detriment of the sick and to the poor patients who entrusted their lives to us? I think so. A lot of these mistakes could have been avoided if the trainees were properly guided and taught. So did I do my part to teach and guide them? My former students should be the one to tell me to my face if I taught them anything. And they are successful consultants now in their own specialties and I am proud of them.

If I could impart a little bit of advice to my trainees, it only consists of two things- one, to abide by the Golden Rule — you do unto others what you want done unto you. That question is at the forefront of all the dealings that I have with my own patients. I would always ask myself before an operation is prescribed to a patient that if I were on the same situation or if my loved ones are suffering from the same condition, would I have that particular operation done also? Will I also take this particular brand or kind of medicine that I am prescribing to my patient if I am on the same boat? The power of healing has been shared to us and with this comes a great deal of responsibility towards

the welfare and over all wellness and safety of our patients. This particular adage also reflects part of the Hippocratic oath of “first do no harm”.

Secondly, caring for patients means service with compassion. Treat your patients as you would care for your own family. At the same time, take note that one also has to care for oneself. For one cannot impart care and compassion if there is no self care and self value. One cannot give what one does not have.

These reflections that I carried throughout my training days have been reinforced by the teachings of my own mentors who have in their own ways walked with me through the ups and downs of my path as a physician and doctor.

I have learned to be forgiving both to myself and everyone in the team. I have accepted the grave mistakes which later led to learning experiences. I have this graveyard in my mind and in my heart. There I bury and archive these failures and when I need them to remind me of the past lessons, I spend some moments praying for the ghosts in this graveyard of mine. And after laying bare my soul, I open it to the Divine Healer for the ultimate guidance. And I emerge back into the present ready to be in the battle for the health of my patients.

Yes, maybe I will continue to teach and mentor and I will not be silent in those times when the need arises. The pain and stress that it also echoes in my heart is there but I cannot allow that the dead will be buried unrecognized. The failures and mistakes need to be written out in bold letters to be the next lessons to be taken to heart by the one committing the errors. They have to have their own graveyard of mistakes where they can seek to gain their own path to wisdom and final forgiveness.

Only when I can speak plainly will I not be part of the silent casualty. For in the end, my silence would lead to more silent casualties of patients and ultimately affect the uncorrected and drag them down into the quagmire of health care mediocrity which will cause more deaths and silence. Alas, by then everyone will be silent casualties.

As a General and Cancer surgeon, I come across patients who are terminally ill with stage 4 cancer. To which, Medical or Surgical treatment seems to be futile. The limitation of doctors to heal becomes apparent. An acceptance of truth that doctors seem to portray sometimes, “My hands are tied. I am not God”.

What then can we do or say? As doctors, if we cannot treat the illness, we are bound to palliate and ease the pain of suffering. At this point of despair, I asked myself on what else can I still offer? As a believer in Christ, to whom a lot of miracles happened, I now offer the HOPE in which our Lord had done and continuously been doing. Definitely, it is being asked of the patient and not being forced to, to provide a semblance of courtesy and respect to one's belief and religion.

Miracle as defined by the dictionary is an effect or event manifesting or considered as a work of God.

Once a patient affirms in this belief, I qualify its meaning, not to its wonder or marvel, but to its application on the patient's reality. Naturally, terminally ill patients would pray for a cure. It happens to some but not to all. Does this mean that God doesn't listen to all? A selective deafness, perhaps? I don't think so. God, in His divine existence, is Omnipotent and Omniscient. Therefore, it is safe to presume that He is aware of our prayers, needs or requests. This may be beyond our human limitation to

grasp. Nevertheless, faith is the one that we hold on to rely in its truthfulness.

Miracles may come in different forms. It may not be the one that we expect or ask for. God may have a different plan or approach but this will be better as anticipated.

“What is essential is invisible to the eye, only through the heart that one can see rightly.” This is an excerpt from the Little Prince. We should learn to decipher our experiences so as to unravel the miracles that we seem to neglect or take for granted.

Board Certification and the Practice of Plastic Surgery

Cosmesis has opened the floodgates and with billions of dollars at stake everywhere in the world, it is rife “and ripe” to partake of the market. Just join the bandwagon whether one is not trained to do procedures and merely be bold and brave enough to do them. This lies on the premise “whatever it takes to earn and get the piece of the pie” at the expense of patient safety.

So what does a Board Certification entail? Many list themselves as plastic surgeons. Those who do are usually not. There is so much internet fabrication and many who advertise are those most commonly the ones who just do not have adequate training and the process to specialize was not robust. Sadly, the social media nowadays foster or even promote online ignorance. Many more pass themselves as Cosmetic Surgeons when in fact they didn't go through an inch of Surgery training. Procedures are not weekend courses. So passing one's self as such but never sufficiently trained and therefore hazardous. More so, none of these claimers took part if an exam conducted by a legitimate board for accreditation of the said specialty. In the U.S, as it is here, there exists a Board which is duly recognized by authorized stakeholders that include the Philippine Medical Association (PMA), the Professional Regulations Commission (PRC) and the Philippine College of Surgeons (PCS). It must be clearly emphasized that the prescribed training specific for aesthetic surgeries be in-depth, duly accredited and accountable.

The Board of Examiners of Plastic Surgery is an independent institution from the PAPRAS. The legitimacy of the Philippine Board of Plastic Surgery defines the purview of the fixed standards of Cosmetics or Aesthetic practice as well. It is also the body that evaluates the quality and standards of Reconstructive Surgery done by its medical specialists under its realm. Thus for a specialist to even take the Board Certifying Examinations, he or she must have graduated from an accredited plastic surgery training program and then have completed the needed number of cases other than fulfilling the stringent requirements of knowledge, length of training, the skills, accompanying responsibilities, competency milestones and practice outcomes of his 3-year tenure as Resident or Fellow. This is after at least a 3-year General Surgery Residency. The Certifying

examination must be hurdled eventually to test the knowledge and minimum workload of the examinee; which becomes the actual test of unparalleled scrutiny. This level is the highest grade of uncompromised diligence conducted by the Board of Examiners to ensure patient and public safety is achieved above all. In other words, plastic surgeons have been trained with complete emphasis on cutting-edge surgical skills, uncompromising decision making especially on the aesthetic and reconstruction groundwork.

The burden of proof is on the patient; especially with the cascade of fake news and internet false advertisements are in abundance. This is to simply lure people towards unscrupulous characters. It is the onus or responsibility of each and every individual to find the proper surgeons for them. I am not saying that those who have the credentials do not make mistakes or unwanted results. But if they do, these board-certified plastic surgeons will be the best surgeons to revise and repair those complications or morbidities.

A study was made by the American Board of Cosmetic Surgery (ASPS 2020), the recognized College providing a certification process for physicians desiring third-party credentialing to deal in aesthetic surgery. The study aimed to show that more than half or 62-63% of advertised surgical operations were performed by specialists (of the 342 cosmetic surgeons screened) worked beyond the scope of what they were trained for (as discovered and monitored by the American Council for Graduate Medical Education which includes the Commission on Dental Accreditation Training Specialties). To enumerate, the following specialties with the highest prevalence of practicing beyond their scope were Internists at 100%, General Surgeons at 95.8%, Obstetrics and Gynecology 85%, Otorhinolaryngology 65%, Dermatology at 51.6%, Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons at 50%. Furthermore, the most commonly performed or offered out-of-scope procedures were Liposuction or Suction-Assisted Lipectomy (60%), Tummy tuck or Abdominoplasty (50%), Breast Augmentation (50%) and Buttock Augmentation (37%). The last two entries are implant-based enhancements without fat grafting. With these alarming findings, there are too many doctors who market themselves beyond

their competencies. So if we expect people to have adaptive social norms, we too as medical professionals must adhere to our honesty, dignity and capability-claims on our roles in society.

Writing on Prosociality, I partly covered on my previous sentence. As we expect to test like everyone for Covid if one becomes symptomatic, or observe social distancing and proper decorum while in a public setting, we, as responsible citizens, should act accordingly. It is an opportunity for everyone, government and citizens alike, to work as one and as a whole, instead of being limited to individual desires and interests. Furthermore, the rule is for the public health interest which is beneficial for the majority. Ergo, all doctors must declare their true expertise capacities.

Patients will be at the mercy of amoral practitioners. Truthfully, patients who seek the right doctor may never comprehend the scope of the physician's training

experience and qualifications. Therefore, it must be made mandatory or even demand a show of responsible doctoring on all of us. A show of the title and printed hard copied-paper of "Board Certified" should come into play. Of course, anything can be faked during this time, but a little more research and perseverance to search for the specialists like in the PAPRAS will never lead patients astray.

Just an additional afterthought for this article on being Diplomates in our career and Diplomats as well. Diplomacy, especially as a profession, requires a lot of drafting and writing. I was informed that K 1-12 students disliked 3 subjects during their studies namely Filipino, Essay Writing and Group Work. I know the issue on Diplomacy is a totally different matter but it is essential on set skills. A mismatch to educational training with important set skills will not develop a child well to become both a Diplomate and a Diplomat. We are our very own Ambassadors of our work, domestically and globally.

“Threads of Healing” Meet and Greet: Unveiling the Vision Behind the Fashion Show

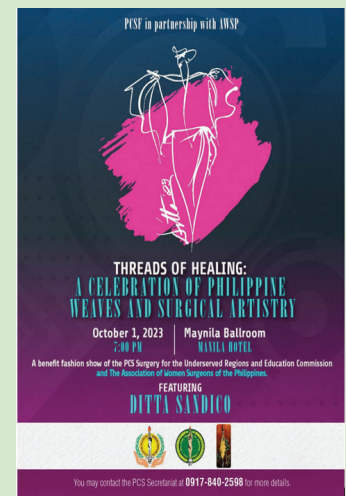

Continuing to Serve: The Philippine Association of Thoracic, Cardiac and Vascular Surgeons, Inc. (PATACSI) Makes a Difference Through Surgical Missions

In the spirit of altruism and dedication to the Filipino community, the PATACSI has remained committed to its mission of providing vital surgical services to those in need. This year, PATACSI has once again demonstrated its unwavering commitment by conducting a series of surgical missions, providing critical medical interventions to numerous patients in various locations across the country.

In the first half of 2023, PATACSI undertook a total of four surgical missions, making a significant impact on the lives of 114 patients who sought medical attention. The organization's dedication to reaching underserved areas and collaborating with different medical facilities and societies is evident in the diverse range of locations where these missions were carried out.

The first mission took place on April 1, 2023, at the Cagayan United Doctors Medical Center, where PATACSI performed 32 arteriovenous fistula (AVF) procedures. This particular intervention is essential for patients undergoing hemodialysis, whose permanent hemodialysis accesses has been delayed due to long waiting times. By providing these services, PATACSI has played a vital role in enhancing the quality of life for those undergoing dialysis treatment in the various regions.

On April 5, 2023, PATACSI conducted another significant surgical mission at the Gat Andres Bonifacio Medical Center. This time, 41 patients received various hemodialysis access procedures, further addressing the critical healthcare needs of individuals relying on regular dialysis treatment to sustain their lives.

Subsequently, on April 24, 2023, the dedicated team of PATACSI surgeons served 21 patients at the Quezon Medical Center. This mission allowed them to extend their reach and impact, ensuring that patients in different parts of the country receive access to much-needed medical attention.

One of the most remarkable highlights of PATACSI's efforts this year was the society's partnership with the Philippine College of Surgeons for the mission entitled "Pagtulong ng PATACSI sa Panahon ng Pandemiya: PATACSI AVF Creation and Venous Access Surgical

Mission." This collaborative effort took place on May 6, 2023, at the Digos Provincial Hospital in Digos City, Davao Del Sur. During this mission, PATACSI conducted a total of 19 hemodialysis access procedures, along with a VATS (video-assisted thoracoscopic surgery) lobectomy.

The successful execution of this mission not only provided essential hemodialysis access but also showcased the organization's expertise in thoracic surgery. By performing the VATS lobectomy, PATACSI demonstrated its capabilities in addressing thoracic conditions and contributing to the advancement of medical care in the country.

Throughout these surgical missions, PATACSI has consistently exemplified its dedication to the well-being of the Filipino people. The selfless efforts of the organization's members have undoubtedly made a profound impact on the lives of the patients they served. The annual travelling fellowship of the AOA is truly a wonderful idea. The program networks people among neighboring ASEAN Orthopedic communities. It bridges the cultures, strengthens camaraderie and forges friendship among ASEAN countries. It also promotes the exchange of ideas, knowledge and experiences through research, lectures, exposure to new technologies and initiates the asking of questions such as: “How do these co-orthopods do it?”.



Being one of the senior travelling fellows of 2023, I was privileged to experience the said program, together with two travelling fellows: Prof. Dr. Abdul Razak Sulaiman from Malaysia (Dean of Universiti Sains Malaysia) and Dr. Bintang Soetjahjo from Indonesia (President Elect Indonesian Orthopaedic Association). Being together and travelling with such colleagues from other countries is truly a great opportunity.

Our journey started in Brunei Darussalam. I learned that Malaysians, Bruneians and Indonesians understand each other, since they share the same language, which is Malay or Bahasa. I also learned that there are only 14 orthopedic surgeons taking care of all Bruneian people with orthopedic needs in the country.



We visited the Rajah Isteri Pengiran Anak Saleha Hospital (RIPAS), the largest government general hospital in Brunei, gave talks to the members of the orthopedic staff and went around the hospital premises. We also visited the largest private hospital in Brunei, the Jerudong Park Medical Center. We also enjoyed our stay in the country, with a little river cruise adventure on Brunei river, home to Kampong Ayer, which is Brunei’s traditional village-on-stilts above river waters. We also saw the longest bridge in Southeast Asia, known as the Temburong Bridge.



Our next stop was the Philippines. We started our journey by visiting the facilities of Jose Reyes Memorial Medical Center (JRMMC). Prof. Razak and Dr. Soetjahjo gave some lectures, wherein the session was interactive, discussing a few pediatric cases. We also had the chance to visit the Philippine General Hospital (PGH), where we visited the gait analysis center and the new orthopedic skills lab. From PGH we paid a visit to our national hero, Dr. Jose Rizal, in Luneta as well as to his monument in Intramuros. At night, we had a dinner with Dr. David Alagar and Dr. Melito Ramos, our POA President and Vice-President respectively. It was a fun night.



The next institution we visited was the De La Salle Health Sciences Institute (DLSHSI) in Dasmariñas, Cavite. In DLSHSI, we were welcomed by the faculty and orthopedic consultant staff of our department, together with the residents, interns, and clerks. Some interesting and interactive lectures were given by our visitors. Specialized areas were visited such as: the Advanced Wound Care Clinic, the new Medical Arts Building and the College of Medicine Building. Prof. Razak, being the Dean of Universiti Sains Malaysia, requested to pay a courtesy call to our Dean of College of Medicine, Prof. Dr. Madeleine Grace Sosa. Lunch was served in Balai Dako in Tagaytay. Going back to Manila, we brought Prof. Razak to the airport for he had to leave for Indonesia to deliver some lectures.



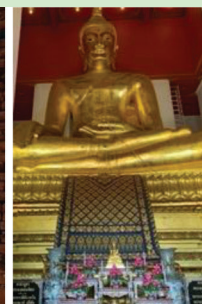
On our 3rd day, we proceeded to the Philippine Orthopedic Center (POC); it is the oldest specialized government funded institution known to take care of the musculoskeletal health of Filipinos. Together with Dr. Soetjahjo, we were welcomed by the consultant staff of the POC and were toured around the facility. We observed that the POC is a well-rounded institution for orthopedics, serving a lot of Filipinos from all walks of life, most specially the needy.



The third country we visited was Thailand, where we met another Malaysian fellow, Dr. Harjeet Singh, who took the place of Prof. Razak. Our first agenda was to meet with the Royal College of Orthopaedic Surgeons of Thailand (RCOST); we felt the warm welcome from our Thai colleagues from the sumptuous dinner prepared for us.



Since it was a Sunday the next day, our itinerary brought us to the very popular tourist spot, the Ayutthaya National Park, which is a ruin of the historical Siam Kingdom. We also visited several Buddah temples, as well as the iconic image of the Buddha head, entwined within the roots of a Banyan tree.



The first hospital we visited in Thailand was the King Chulalongkorn Memorial Hospital (KCMH), a public general and tertiary hospital in Bangkok. The KCMH serves as the teaching hospital for the Faculty of Medicine of Chulalongkorn University, and is one of the largest hospitals in Thailand. We toured around the hospital facilities, including their operating theaters, out-patient clinics, and vast skills lab, where various international live surgeries are held. We also visited their cadaver lab, where they kept a huge supply of cadavers.



The next day, we visited the Police General Hospital (PGH), which is directed by an orthopedic surgeon. We were warmly welcomed by the faculty and staff of the orthopedic department, who toured us in their facilities. We also had the opportunity to deliver our lectures to them and their students.



Our last stop was in Malaysia; here we had the opportunity to join the 52nd Malaysian Orthopaedic Association Annual Scientific Meeting and Annual General Meeting held in Penang, filling our minds with knowledge and experiences. We were invited to the Presidential dinner, where we gained new colleagues and friends from ASEAN luminaries. Penang was adorable with rich history combined with diverse ethnicity, culture, language and religion. We also had the chance to tour Georgetown Cannon Square in Penang Hill.

PSCRS holds 13th Int'l. Scientific Meeting

The Philippine Society of Colon and Rectal Surgeons, Inc. (PSCRS) held its 13th International Scientific Meeting last March 17 to 18, 2023. It started with two pre-congress workshops. The first workshop was a laparoscopic colon surgery cadaveric workshop done last March 15, 2023 in the Philippine Cancer for Advanced Surgery (PCAS) in Cardinal Santos Medical Center. The anal fistula workshop was then held on March 16, 2023 in the Philippine General Hospital. Both were held in a hybrid interactive format.

The first pre-congress workshop entitled, "Laparoscopic Colon Surgery Cadaveric Workshop," was held in conjunction with PSCRS and the Unified Minimally Invasive Surgery Training Program (UMIST) at the PCAS. The event was moderated by Drs. Kelvin Alex Uy and Dr. Kenneth Yabut. Lectures were given during the morning session by Drs. Ryan Raniel Abary, Carlo Angelo Cajucom, Andrei Cesar Abella, and Joseph Roy Fuentes. The cadaveric hands-on workshop was done after lunch with the following facilitators: Dr. Jan Paolo Cruz, Dr. Mark Anthony Fontanilla, and Dr. Mark Augustine Onglao.

The second pre-congress workshop, "Anal Fistula Workshop: Inherent Challenges and Proposed Solutions," was headed by Dr. Jeryl Anne Reyes and held in the Philippine General Hospital with invited experts locally and internationally. Dr. Maher Abbas from Cleveland Clinic Dubai shared his experiences and demonstrated techniques he uses for complex

anal fistulas. He was joined by Dr. Hermogenes Monroy, III in the operating theatre, while Dr. Manuel Francisco Roxas participated in the interactive sessions throughout the day. The workshop was attended by surgical trainees of various institutions in the Estrada Hall Auditorium, while some fellows were encouraged to join in the surgeries with Dr. Abbas. The workshop was held to enhance the knowledge of both general surgery residents and subspecialty trainees in the art and science of the management of the whole spectrum of anal fistula – from the most basic to the more complex.

The congress proper then started on March 17, 2023. Dr. Carlo Angelo C. Cajucom, the outgoing PSCRS President, opened the convention and Dr. Marc Paul J. Lopez, PSCRS President-elect, gave a general overview. Dr. Maria Minerva P. Calimag, Philippine Medical Association (PMA) President, and Dr. Maria Concepcion C. Vesagas, Philippine College of Surgeons (PCS) President, gave their messages. Dr. Vesagas also inducted the new set of officers of the PSCRS for the year 2023 to 2025. This was followed by the presentation and conferment of the new PSCRS Fellows by Drs. Armando C. Crisostomo, Hermogenes J. Monroy III, and Carlo Angelo C. Cajucom. The newly inducted Fellows were: Drs. Willmar Jayve Añoaso, Joanna Pauline Baltazar, Anisa Sadain-Bangcola, Jesus Dabalos Jr., Kerby Chloe Go, Michael Geoffrey Lim, Raleigh Lean Rojas, Tristan Trinidad, and Cristeta Unira.





The Dr. Porfirio M. Recio Memorial Lecture was given by Dr. Francis Seow-Chen. His lecture, entitled, “How to build an international Colorectal Surgery Department,” focused on strategies and insights on building up linkages for a collaborative international colorectal surgery program. Dr. Omar O. Ocampo, PSCRS Secretary, then presented the Honorary Fellowship to Dr. Francis Seow-Chen.

Other distinguished international faculty joined the scientific meeting face-to-face. They shared their knowledge and views regarding the differences and similarities in the management of colon and rectal diseases on a global scale. The various international speakers were:

The fellowship night was held in the evening at the Constellation of the Diamond Hotel Philippines. Drs. Carlo Cajucom and Robert Bandolon served as the hosts, and the international guests were given the traditional “balut” as a welcome and in appreciation of their contributions to the Philippine surgery. The fellowship celebrations continued to the late hours of the night with the Intimate Band serenading the attendees throughout the festivities.

Day 2 of the congress began with the fellows-in-training of the various accredited training

programs presenting their abstracts in the PSCRS Colorectal Compendium. Currently, there are eleven accredited training institutions for colorectal surgery fellowship in the Philippines: University of the Philippines – Philippine General Hospital (Manila), Jose R. Reyes Memorial Medical Center (Manila), The Medical City (Pasig City), Rizal Medical Center (Pasig City), Quirino Memorial Medical Center (Quezon City), St. Luke’s Medical Center (Quezon City), UERM Memorial Medical Center (Quezon City) and Amang Rodriguez Memorial Medical Center (Marikina City) Consortium, East Avenue Medical Center (Quezon City), Batangas Medical Center (Batangas City), Vicente Sotto Memorial Medical Center (Cebu City) and Southern Philippines Medical Center (Davao City).

Apart from the international speakers, renowned local experts from different specialties of medicine and surgery were invited to share their expertise in their respective fields regarding the management of colon and rectal diseases. They were: Arthur Dessi E. Roman, MD, FPCP, FPSMID (Infectious Diseases), Aileen Patricia M. Madrid, MD, FPCS, FPSGS, FPSST (Critical Care and Trauma), Lisa Teresa T. Prodigalidad-Jabson, MD, FPOGS, FPSURPS (Obstetrics and Gynecology). Mr. Nathan P. Monty, an engineer, also shared his novel instrument in the identification of metastasis using a laser device. The congress was closed with a panel discussion on Intraoperative Complications in Colorectal Surgery, chaired by Dr. Enrico P. Ragaza and co-chaired by Dr. John Paul P. Gonzales.



The PSCRS 14th International Scientific Meeting will be held on March 14-16, 2024. This will be in conjunction with the 12th ASEAN Society of Colorectal Surgeons (ASCS) Biennial Clinical Congress.

On March 30, 2023, the PCS held a virtual multidisciplinary tumor board meeting, “Colon and Rectal Cancer Virtual Multidisciplinary Tumor Board: Beyond Adenocarcinoma.” This was organized by the PCS Cancer Commission and hosted by the PSCRS. Case discussions on the uncommon colorectal cancers such as perianal squamous cell carcinoma, perianal basal cell carcinoma and rectal neuroendocrine tumors were presented in a multidisciplinary format with the following as panelists: Dr. Mark Anthony Fontanilla (Colorectal Surgery) and Dr. Michael Catiwalaan Catiwala-an (Colorectal Surgery), Dr. Joar Kent Gumapon (Medical Oncology), Dr. Anna Maria Fineza (Radiation Oncology), and Dr. Evangeline Barbara Go (Hospice and Palliative Medicine).

A Round Table Discussion on Inflammatory Bowel Disease (IBD) was also held last May 27 and 28, 2023 at the Makati Diamond Residences. This was the first round table discussion to be held with various subspecialties, namely adult gastroenterology, pediatric gastroenterology, and colorectal surgery. This was hosted by the IBD Club of the Philippines to raise awareness on the rise of IBD in the Filipino population. The conference was conceptualized and spearheaded by Dr. Jose D. Sollano, Jr., Adult Gastroenterology, and Dr. Robert L. Chang, Colorectal Surgery.

Several PSCRS fellows, fellows-in-training, and surgery residents were able to attend the American Society of Colon and Rectal Surgeons (ASCRS) Annual Scientific Meeting held last June 3-6, 2023 in Seattle, Washington, USA. They presented their research papers and listened to the various workshops and lectures during the said event. A total of 1 oral podium presentation and 22 e-poster presentations were given and exhibited by the Philippine delegates. Dr. Mario Angelo A. Zamora was invited to present his work orally in the ASCRS annual congress in a face-to-face format and is the first Filipino to do so. He presented his work on the cost analysis of patients undergoing Enhanced Recovery after Surgery (ERAS) in the Philippine setting.

The PCS Metro Manila Chapter (MMC), PSCRS, and PCS Foundation, Inc. held a webinar, “Contemporary Management of Locally Advanced Rectal Cancer” last June 28, 2023, via Zoom. Drs. Willmar Jayve M. Anoso, Romulo R. Cabantac III, Raleigh Lean P. Rojas, and Tristan F. Trinidad shared their expertise on the different issues regarding the said topic. The event was opened by Dr. Ferdinand Y. Syfu, PCS MMC President. Messages from Dr. Marc Paul J. Lopez, PSCRS President, and Dr. Maria Concepcion C. Vesagas, PCS President, followed thereafter. The event was moderated by Dr. Omar O. PSTS Holds Multi-Organ Donor Retrieval Workshop

The Philippine Society for Transplant Surgeons (PSTS) is committed to the promotion of the deceased organ donation which can help supplant the persistent scarcity of organ donors and the corresponding transplantable solid organs. For this purpose, through its leadership, the incumbent PSTS President, Dr. Rose Marie O. Rosete-Liquete, organized a Deceased Donor Multi-organ Retrieval Workshop at the Philippine Center for Advanced Surgery, Cardinal Santos Medical Center, Greenhills, San Juan City last June 13, 2023.

This first and “one-of-a-kind” activity resulted from an academic grant by Medtronic and the collaborative efforts of the PSTS, the Transplantation Society of the Philippines (TSP), Philippine Heart Center (PHC), Lung Center of the Philippines (LCP), National Kidney and Transplant Institute (NKTi) and the Human Organ Preservation Effort (HOPE) and aimed to help the participants to achieve the following objectives:

- 1) understand the Referral Pathway for potential Deceased Organ Donors
- 2) understand the Manpower which forms the Organ Retrieval Team
- 3) develop skills for the effective retrieval of organs for transplantation
- 4) launch the Manual of Deceased Organ and Tissue Donation

With these goals in mind, transplant surgeons, fellows-in-training, transplant coordinators, and operating room nurses gathered together in a day-long activity which consisted of a half-day didactics followed by hands-on organ retrieval skills training on cadavers.

The didactics started with lectures on the proper utilization of cadavers for education and surgical training, a description on the current status of deceased organ donation in the country, introduction to the Deceased Donor Manual, Operating Room set-up, and the processes for organ retrieval surgery for the heart, lung, liver, kidney, pancreas, small intestines, and segmental liver resection.

The hands-on training on the cadavers provided an opportunity for the surgeons to simulate the actual procedure performed during the organ donor retrieval. Whilst it may not closely resemble the realism of the clinical setting where the donor still has a heartbeat (brain-dead) and therefore the organs still



have perfusion, dissection of the cadaver in the skills laboratory still enabled the surgeons to be familiar with the anatomical structures, the dissection, and the explantation and later, reimplantation of organs.

Speakers included: Drs. Gerardo S. Manzo and Avenilo Jun L. Aventura, from the PHC, Drs. Jose Luis J. Danguilan (virtual), Edmund E. Villaroman and Ruari Lee, from the LCP; Drs. Siegfredo R. Paloyo, Adolfo C. Parayno and Jose Benito A. Abraham, from the NKTi and Dante Allan Concejero MD from the St. Luke's Medical Center in Global City. The speakers from the Nursing Staff included Peter Plegaria, RN, Genevieve Joves-Lukban, RN, Malvin Ian Lim, RN (NKTi) and Lans Santiago, RN.

Hopefully, this Workshop marks the beginning of several training workshops which will help us do a more efficient donor organ retrieval that will benefit a lot of patients awaiting a transplant.

Neurotrauma has been identified by the WHO as a public health burden with 50-60 million traumatic brain injuries per year (MC Dewan 2018) but it has only been in recent years that attention has been given towards this not so “silent epidemic”. It has been the leading cause of disability to the young generation due to motor vehicle accidents especially in the low to middle income countries (LMIC).

The Neurotrauma Committee of the Asian Australasian Society of Neurological Surgeons (AASNS) chaired by Dr. Lynne Lourdes N. Lucena, who is also the immediate Vice President of the Academy of Filipino Neurosurgeons (AFNI) endeavored to start educational courses and advocacy awareness about Neurotrauma.

As the First Philippine Neurotrauma Bootcamp was conceptualized and modules were created, the organizing committee in Zamboanga City, Philippines was headed by Dr. Gaudencio Tan Ligutom, a member of the Neurotrauma subcommittee -Philippines. Together with the officers of the AASNS headed by President Kate Drummond, the three- day activity was realized with the support of the AFNI fellows and the UERM Neurosurgery Alumni Association and partners

It was a hybrid platform powered by Docquity and was broadcasted nationally and in several countries. The attendees reached 220 and represented the medical, nursing, education, allied medical profession and the military who registered for free and was entitled to the lectures, didactics and also demonstrations aside from enjoying free meals and snacks. In the first few months of this year, the fellows, and the officers of the PCS—Cordillera Chapter have tried their best in implementing activities that would cater to the two focus areas of PCS namely social involvement and outreach, and professional development. 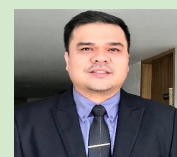

Applicants for PCS Fellowship

The final list of applicants for PCS Fellowship has been received by the Committee on Membership after several changes resulting from late applicants and the deadline being moved further to accommodate them. The number has reached a record-high of 104 applicants who will be inducted during the opening ceremonies of the forthcoming Annual Clinical Congress this December. New graduates from accredited training programs who passed the Certifying Exams given by their respective Specialty Boards and those who completed all the requirements have submitted their applications via the regular route for application for Fellowship to the College. Since last year, the PCS has simplified the acceptance of applications for fellowship for surgeons who have been Fellows of their respective Specialty Societies for at least 3 years. The documentary requirements have been greatly reduced; there is no deadline; and the application can be submitted online. This year, 38 applications were received via the simplified route. For most applicants in the simplified route, there is no deadline and there are several options where they can have their Induction. Those who want to be inducted during the Annual Clinical Congress in December, however, are advised to submit their application no later than August 30.
